Library now offers 'no contact' curbside pick-up Crown Poin

The Crown Point Community Library has announced no-contact curbside pickup for library materials, which began last week. The service will be available:

- Crown Point location: Monday-Friday from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.
- Winfield location: Tuesday and Thursday: 10 a.m. to 6

To request library materials for curbside pickup:

- Place a hold via the library's online catalog or call the library location by phone. When your items are available for pick-up, you will receive a notification, by text or email, or if you have opted out of notifications, the library will call you when your items are
- available for pick up. · Only after you have received the notification, from the library, should you arrive for curbside pick-up.
- Pull into a designated curb-

side pick-up spot, call the library and notify the staff member of your parking spot number.

- Remain inside your vehicle.
- Library staff will bring your bagged items out to you and place them on the curbside pick-up sign.
- Library staff is following strict sanitation, hand-washing procedures, and wear masks/face shields while delivering your materials.

Library materials can only be returned to our book drops.

- All items are quarantined for three days before they are checked in, so you may still see items listed on your account after you return them.
- · Any fines accrued during the quarantine period are waived when they are checked in.
- Note that in severe er, curbside pick-up service

may be suspended temporarily. Curbside pick-up is a new procedure, please be patient as we work through the logistics of this new library service.

The library asks their patrons to help in their efforts to curb the spread of COVID-19 when using the curbside service. Please do not use this service if you are showing symptoms, have had a fever in the last 24 hours, or otherwise think you may have or need to be tested for COVID-19.

As a reminder, the buildings remain closed to the public at this time, all inlibrary programming and meeting room use is suspended until further notice. Library leadership is carefully considering and planning the necessary precautions to determine when we can reopen to the community. We will communicate further in-

College enrollment has declined for several years in Indiana and the trend continues, as outlined today in the state's 2020 College Readiness Report. The new report from the Indiana Commission for Higher Education shows 61% of Indiana's high school graduates in 2018 enrolled in postsecondary education at the certificate, two-year and fouryear degree levels. This compares to college-going rates of 63% in 2017 and 65% in

"We have been keeping a sharp eye on this slow decline for several years. What we have found is that historically, fewer people enroll in college when the economy is strong, choosing instead to enter the workforce," said Indiana Commissioner for Higher Education Teresa Lubbers. "It is too early to tell if that trend will continue due to the coronavirus-related downturn. However, for many Hoosiers who are out of work or considering a new career path, this is the time to re-skill or enhance their options with advanced educa-

Though the college-going rate has declined, the report also shows high school graduates who go to college after graduation are better prepared for higher learning than ever before. Just 9% of the class of 2018 required remediation (additional classes or coursework to be able to take college-level courses), compared to 28 % of the class of 2014.

Also highlighted: The

college-going rate for students enrolled in the state's early college promise program, 21st Century Scholars, remains high at 86%. Grade point averages of the state's college freshmen are going up, particularly for Black and Hispanic Hoosiers.

"Again and again, the data show the 21st Century Scholars program is one of the best tools we have for educational equity in Indiana," Lubbers said. "It is encouraging to see this positive momentum for low-income Hoosiers and students of color."

High school graduates who earn the state's Academic Honors Diploma are significantly more likely to enroll in college, compared to the Core 40 and general diploma (91%, compared to 49% and 15%, respectively).

Additionally, a majority of Hoosier students pursue some form of early college credit while in high school, with 64% of graduates in 2018 earning dual credit or Advanced Placement credit.

Of those students who earn any form of early college credit through an Indiana public college, nearly threequarters enrolled in college.

The report also shows more high school graduates are choosing to study Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM)-related programs than any other program. This is also the only program area that grew yearover-year for college-going high school graduates.

Indiana Pearl Harbor survivor conquers COVID-19

Robert Bates is a survivor. The Hoosier native was a young man, serving as an army air corps mechanic in WWII when the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941. Mr. Bates was one of only three men from his company to survive the attack on that fateful day.

Returning home to Indiana after the war, Robert raised a family and devoted his career to serving others as a postal worker. He first came to American Village, part of American Senior Communities, in 2011 for rehabilitation and he returned to the campus in 2015 as a long-term care resident.

As the COVID-19 pandemic spread through communities across the nation, Robert was not spared. Having tested positive for COVID-19, he recently spent weeks in the VA Hospital, Indianapolis battling double pneumonia at 98 years of

age. Once cleared to return home, he rejoined his American Village family in recovery mode. According to Director of Nursing, Ashley Collins, "Robert has never given up his fight and he is getting stronger every day."

Ashley and Robert are close friends; as Robert's CARE Companion, Ashley regularly joins him for breakfast where they often talk about Colts football, their shared passion. Returning to

American Village after his COVID battle, Robert had lost both weight and strength but thanks to the dedication of his American Village team of care givers, he is making wonderful progress on his

ates who went straight to college after graduation in 2018 pursued a four-year degree than in the previous year (71%, compared to 69%); over a quarter of high school graduates pursued a two-year degree.

Additionally, the percentage of students pursuing certificates, including short- and long-term workforce certificates, has increased by over 50% since 2012.

The Commission's new strategic plan, Reaching Higher in a State of Change, outlines numerous policy positions and action areas to drive college-going access and success, including improving completion rates and expanding the definition of "higher education" to include a full range of credentials - including short- and longterm certificates, apprenticeships, two- and four-year degrees and more.

"It is more crucial than ever to emphasize the value of higher education. That includes ensuring students connect with the most appropriate options for their futures, so that they persist and complete and are able to fully utilize the opportunities that come along with higher learning - whatever form it takes," Lubbers said.

University of Saint Francis plans to return to on-campus instruction this fall

University of Saint Francis President Sister M. Elise Kriss, OSF, recently sent an update to students, faculty and staff about the university's plan to return to oncampus instruction this fall. Her letter outlines the details:

Dear Students, Faculty and Staff:

As we conclude the 2019-2020 academic year, we all recognize that it was a challenging and unprecedented spring semester due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Because of the dedication and hard work of everyone in the University of Saint Francis community - students, faculty and staff - we were able to quickly transition to remote instruction immediately after spring break. This mode of learning will continue through the summer sessions. Thanks again for your creativity and persistence in this effort.

We plan to return to oncampus, classroom instruction with the fall semester and we look forward to welcoming our new and returning students to campus in August. This decision is predicated, of course, on following the guidelines and recommendations of federal, state and local health and government authorities. On-campus, faceto-face instruction might look different than it did prior to the COVID-19 pandemic. The world has changed, and higher education is no exception. USF is committed to adjusting to this "new normal" and implementing the most efficient and productive approaches to provide our students with the high-quality education for which the university is known.

USF will pursue the best ways possible to provide for the educational needs of our students as well as the health and safety of everyone on the USF campus. As campgrounds, inns, restaurants, park offices and nature centers reopen at Indiana State Parks, some other features that summer guests traditionally use at those and other DNR properties will open soon, while others will remain closed.

Rentable picnic shelters. recreation buildings and rally camps opened June 1 for groups of 100 or fewer people, with social distancing. Property offices have reopened to members of the public who want to purchase passes, permits and fishing licenses.

The DNR's public outdoor swimming pools will remain closed for the 2020 summer season due to limitations in the ability to practice social distancing on the confined space of pool decks. Locations of those closed pools include Mounds, Prophetstown, Turkey Run, McCormick's Creek, Spring Mill, Brown County, Versailles, Clifty Falls, O'Bannon Woods, Shakamak and Harmonie

state parks, along with the pool at Cagles Mill Lake (Lieber State Recreation

Even with pools closed there are many other places at DNR properties across the state to cool off on a hot day.

Most beaches, which have adequate space for guests to practice social distancing on the sand and in grassy areas in most locations, opened Memorial Day weekend and are great places to enjoy the water.

These are located at Pokagon, Potato Creek, Chain O'Lakes, Indiana Dunes, Ouabache, Lincoln, Whitewater Memorial and Summit Lake state parks, Cecil M. Harden (Raccoon SRA), Mississinewa, Monroe, Patoka, Brookville and Hardy lakes and Deam Lake and Starve Hollow SRAs and Ferdinand State Forest. The beaches at Cagles Mill (Lieber SRA) and Salamonie lakes will reopen when the currently high water returns to safe levels.

Kayaks, canoes and pad-

dleboats provide an alternative option for water-based recreation. Some or all types of watercraft are available for rent at several park locations with lakes, including Pokagon State Park and Trine SRA, as well as Chain O'Lakes, Lincoln, Ouabache, Potato Creek, Shakamak, Spring Mill, Summit Lake, Versailles and Whitewater Memorial state parks, and at Cagles Mill Lake (Cataract Falls SRA.) Boat rentals are also available at Ferdinand and Yellowwood state forests, and Deam Lake and Starve Hollow, all of which are operated by the Division of Forestry. Marinas at Brookville, Cagles Mill (Lieber SRA), Cecil M. Harden (Raccoon SRA), Monroe. Mississinewa, Patoka and Salamonie lakes offer rental boats to explore

Update on summer recreation opportunities at Community deer hunting coordinator training offered July 11; registration deadline June 26

Individuals interested in becoming qualified as Community Hunting Access Program (CHAP) deer hunting coordinators are invited to attend this year's training session on Saturday, July 11.

CHAP is designed hunting increase opportunities for white-tailed deer in communities and help alleviate human/deer conflicts. CHAP is described in detail at www.wildlife. IN.gov/9420.htm.

The training will run from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the DNR Fish & Wildlife Bloomington

Field Office. Coordinators may be hired by communities applying for CHAP to implement safe deer hunting practices in various types of communities, parks, and terrains in accordance with the CHAP program. Training will cover topics including the biology of white-tailed deer, deer management options, and successful deer hunting in urban communities.

The training will be contracted through White Buffalo, Inc. An online portion of training will be required prior to attending the in-person training session.

Training-session participants should come ready to participate and take notes. An outdoor field trip portion of the session is planned, and participants should come dressed appropriately for the weather, ready to caravan to the field trip location with their own lunches. Lunch will not be provided.

Registration is required for the event, and the deadline is Friday, June 26. Participation is limited to 20 people. To learn more and register, visit www.bit.ly/2THjFHM.

Department of Natural Resources seeks volunteer paddlers for wildlife monitoring

The DNR is asking paddlers to report their wildlife observations while paddling Indiana waterways from June 1 to July 31.

Paddling is a great way to enjoy Indiana's natural beauty, observe wildlife, and connect with nature, and DNR is hoping to collect more information about the wildlife that frequents Indiana's waterways. Hoosiers who paddle can collect information that will help Indiana manage wildlife for future generations.

The Indiana Paddlecraft Wildlife Index compiles wildlife observations from people who use canoes, kayaks, or other non-motorized paddlecraft around the Hoosier state. Volunteer paddlers can help by signing up to complete paddling trip postcards documenting the wildlife they observe while on the water.

The collected information will allow wildlife managers to estimate changes in

key wildlife populations over time. With paddlers' help, DNR may also gain insight into new locations where these species live.

USDOT announces \$177.5 million in funding for transit infrastructure projects, including Lake County

The U.S. Department of Transportation's Federal Transit Administration recently announced a \$177.5 million federal funding allocation to two transit projects in Lake County and Indianapolis, Indiana. The projects are among 12 transit infrastructure investment projects across the country that are receiving part of a \$891 million funding allocation as they advance toward readiness for a construction grant agreement. Funding is provided through FTA's Capital Investment Grants Program.

"This \$891 million in federal funding for our country's public transit system will facilitate the ability of millions of Americans to access jobs and critical services," said U.S. Transportation Secretary Elaine L. Chao.

The Indiana transit proj-

ects receiving a funding allocation are the West Lake Corridor Commuter Rail Project in Lake County, Indiana, and the IndyGo Purple Rapid Transit Line in Indianapolis.

The West Lake Corridor Commuter Rail Project is a 7.8-mile southern extension of the Northern Indiana Commuter Transportation District's (NICTD) existing South Shore Line commuter rail service between Dyer and Hammond in Indiana, and includes four new stations. FTA is allocating \$100 million in FY 2020 funds to the project.

The IndyGo Purple Rapid Transit Line is a 14.8-mile Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) line to be constructed by the Indianapolis Public Transportation Corporation (IndyGo) between downtown Indianapolis and downtown Lawrence. FTA is allocating \$27 million in FY 2018 CIG funds and \$50.5 million in FY 2019 CIG funds to the project, to complete the CIG funding request.

"These projects help Lake County and Indianapolis improve access to jobs and essential services for transit riders, and will help these areas recover from the impacts of COVID-19," said FTA Acting Administrator K. Jane Williams.



Indiana Secretary of State issues advisory to raise awareness of private offering risks

The COVID-19 pandemic significant caused disruption and anxiety to individuals and the financial markets. Because fraudsters often try to capitalize on current issues and problems to promote their scams, Indiana Secretary of State Connie Lawson today issued an investor advisory on exempt securities offerings, also known as "private placements," in light of the coronavirus pandemic.

A private placement is a securities offering that is not required by law to be registered with federal or

state securities regulators. Private placements allow companies to sell stocks, bonds, or other securities to investors without completing the rigorous disclosures necessary in a registered offering.

Businesses raising capital through private placement offerings often have limited operating histories and frequently have modest revenues compared to larger public companies. They are not required to provide as much information to investors as public companies are required to provide under federal securities laws.

Private offerings made under Rule 506 are not reviewed by regulators and, as a result, there is an increased potential for fraud. The most recent enforcement statistics collected by the North American Securities Administrators Association, of which the Secretary of State is a member, identified private placements as one of the most frequent sources of enforcement actions by state securities regulators.

The advisory provides an overview of private placement offerings, the

This day in history

June 5, 1968

Senator Robert Kennedy was shot at the Ambassador Hotel in Los Angeles after winning the California presidential primary. Immediately after he announced to his cheering supporters that the country was ready to end its fractious divisions, Kennedy was shot several times by the 22-year-old Palestinian Sirhan Sirhan. He died a

In the summer of 1968, both the Vietnam War and the anti-war movement were peaking, especially after the Tet Offensive. Martin Luther King Jr. had been assassinated in the spring, igniting riots across the country. President Lyndon B. Johnson decided not to seek a second term in the upcoming presidential election.

After winning California's primary, Kennedy was in the position to receive the Democratic nomination and face off against Richard Nixon in the general election.

As Rafer Johnson and Roosevelt Grier accompanied Kennedy out a rear exit of the hotel, Sirhan Sirhan stepped forward with a rolled up campaign poster, hiding his .22 revolver. He was only a foot away when he fired several shots at Kennedy.

Sirhan confessed to the crime at his trial and received a death sentence. However, since the California State Supreme Court invalidated all death penalty sentences in 1972, Sirhan has spent the rest of his life in prison.




