St. Mary's Elicia Cruz takes GeoBee geography competition title at St. Mary's School

Nine students from St. Mary Catholic School recently participated in the school competition the National Geographic GeoBee. Elicia Cruz, a 7th grade student, won first place, with Andy Parent, a 7th grade student, winning second place and Kailana Urbanek, a 4th grade student, finishing in third place.

The school competition is the first round in the annual National Geographic GeoBee, a geography competition designed to inspire and reward students' curiosity about the world. Questions cover not only geography, but also ancient and world civilizations, cultures, and physical features.

The national Geographic Society developed Geobee in 1989 in response to concern about the lack of geographic knowledge among young people in the United States. Over more than three decades, more than 120 million students have learned about the world through participation in the

School champions, including Cruz, will take an online qualifying test; up to 100 of the top test scorers in each state then become eligible to compete in their State Geobee.

The winners of the State GeoBees receive an all-expenses-paid trip to participate in the GeoBee national championship in Spring 2020. Students will be competing for cash prizes, scholarships, and an all-expensespaid Lindblad expedition to

the Galapagos islands aboard the National Geographic Endeavour II. Learn more at www.natgeobee.org

Indiana Department hool information and data portal novative sci INview introduces a new lev-

The Indiana Department of Education formally launched Indiana's new modernized data portal, INview. Replacing Indiana's current information portal Compass, and designed to fulfill federal accountability requirements for transparency under the Every Student Succeeds Act, INview provides a robust view of districts and schools for both state and federal accountability measures, while sharing the performance and progress of Indiana schools.

"Hoosiers deserve trans-

surrounding the parency academic performance and fiscal solvency of all Indiana schools," said State Superintendent Dr. Jennifer McCormick. "INview is designed to provide this transparency to the extent identified by statute. INview is an outward-facing ESSA report card allowing Hoosiers to monitor, celebrate, and select the state's K-12 education options and to better understand taxpayer investments."

Created with parents in mind, INview serves as IDOE's new public-facing portal for school-level data. INview brings a new mobileready experience to school performance data in a userfriendly question and answer format. As such, INview includes new data points not previously available on Compass. These include student-level spending for every Indiana public school, school environment data (including suspensions and expulsions), school-specific teaching level experience and demographics, and state and national

awards and recognitions received. In addition, INview provides data for a variety of demographics, such as students in foster care, students who are homeless, students military-connected families, students identified as high ability, and more.

INview also provides a variety of options to compare districts and schools. One such new option, titled "schools like me," allows schools to be compared to other schools with similar demographics. Additionally, el of school groupings called Networks. Networks are groups of schools aligned for a particular purpose outside of the traditional school/district arrangement. Examples include such groupings as all charter schools authorized by a particular charter school authorizer, all schools of a chosen Archdiocese, and all schools associated with a certain education service center. Any networks to which a school belongs are clearly identified on the profile page of each school.

One notable new feature of INview is the ability for schools to customize their page with graphics and text highlighting key programs and features specific to their schools.

The Franciscan Health EMS Academy will offer students the opportunity to earn their emergency medical technician (EMT) certification in just 12 weeks; half the time of a typical course.

Accelerated weekend classes will be available at Franciscan Health Hammond, 5454 Hohman Avenue, during the spring and fall. Classes will be 6 p.m. to 10 p.m. Friday and 12 p.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

The Spring session will be February 21 to May 17 and the Fall course will be September 11 to November 29.

In Dyer, the accelerated summer course will be at the Dyer Fire Department, 2150 Hart. Street from May 19 to August 7. Classes will be 12 p.m. to 4 p.m. on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday.

The Franciscan Health EMS Academy is a specialized program providing quality training for those interested in obtaining their National Registry EMT Certification, allowing them to work in the state of their choice. Certification opens doors to new job opportunities, including firefighter, police officer, private ambulance services, emergency room technician, home healthcare and organ/tissue procurement. It's also a prerequisite for the paramedic program.

Students must have a high school diploma or equivalent and be age 18 by the time of the state exam. They must also have a valid driver's license, a felony free record and must successfully pass a 10-panel drug screen and tuberculosis test. Current high school students must have current transcripts reviewed to allow for enrollment.



Valparaiso University receives historic \$15 million gift for student scholarships

Valparaiso University has received a landmark \$15 million deferred gift commitment from anonymous donors to establish an endowed fund for student scholarships. The commitment is the single largest gift for student scholarships in Valpo's 161-year history and among the largest gifts to Forever Valpo: The Campaign for Our Future.

"The impact of this overwhelming generosity on future generations of students will be immeasurable, and for that we shall all be forever grateful," said Valparaiso University President Mark A. Heckler, Ph.D. "These donors embody the true spirit of philanthropy in that they are motivated solely by their desire to give back and providing opportunities that will change students' lives. countless students, students whom they will never meet, with a chance to achieve their dreams through an extraordinary Valpo experience."

Each year, the selected students will be part of a co-hort and carry the distinction of being scholars named in honor of the donors. The co-horts will also be supported by a dedicated advisor from the Valpo faculty who will provide guidance to these students as they advance through and complete their Valpo education. The application process will be determined in the future, and prior to availability of scholarship funds.


Earth Day lessons are available for elementary schools and vary in length from 30 to 50 minutes. The interactive presentations offer activities



The following scholarship was added to the 2020 general scholarship application: *Crown Point Swim Club Alumni Scholarship:*

Graduating senior from Lake County, IN with minimum 2.5 GPA. Member or alumni of Crown Point Swim Club. Proof of completion of 12 seasons (6 years) on Crown Point Swim Club required. Majoring in the fields of Business, Science, or Engineering at any accredited college or university. Must maintain a 2.0 GPA every year in college to receive additional scholarship payments. \$5,000 per yr. for 4 yrs.

In addition to student scholarships, the CPCF also offers adult scholarships. Applications for adult scholarships will be available in May.

United Way seeks volunteers for free VITA tax preparation program

United Way of Porter County is seeking volunteers to help Northwest Indiana residents file their 2019 federal and state income taxes in the 2020 tax season.

Operated under the guidance of the Internal Revenue Service and hosted by United Way of Porter County, the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program provides free tax filing services to all residents with an adjusted gross income of \$56,000 or less.

"We are pleased to offer the VITA program again in 2020," said Kim Olesker, president and CEO of United Way of Porter County. "It could not be done without the help of dedicated volunteers."

Last year's volunteers prepared more than 800 federal returns and nearly 900 state returns. United Way looks to help more than 1,000 residents file their tax returns in 2020.

"This is such a needed service in Northwest Indiana," said George Kuebler, United Way of Porter County VITA supervisor. "Some of our dedicated volunteers will return, but many more are needed so that we won't have to turn


residents away."

Volunteers serve as greeters, reviewers and tax preparers. No previous experience is required and hours are flexible. The IRS provides free tax law training and materials.

Tax professionals, enrolled agents and non-credentialed return preparers can earn continuing education credits by volunteering. The 2020 VITA program will begin in February and run weekdays and some Saturdays until April 15, 2020.

Department of Natural Resources historic preservation photo

Begin the new decade by entering a revamped historic preservation photo contest. The annual contest, run by the DNR Division of Historic Preservation & Archaeology, has been held since 2005 using a traditional print format to promote Indiana's historic resources. While the purpose remains the same, this year the contest is moving to accepting only digital submissions; printed photos will not be accepted.

As in previous years, all subjects of photos must be at least 50 years old and in Indiana. Photos can be black and white or color and must have been taken within the last two years. Each photographer may enter up to three images, and an entry form is required for each photo.

Images should be emailed to aborland@dnr.IN.gov and must be JPEG files that are 10mb or smaller. Participants will only be able to send one photo and one entry form per email.

Participants will need to select one of five contest categories on the entry form in which to enter their photo: Color, Black & White, Kids (younger than age 18), Artistic, and Altered Image.

Applications available for law school assistance program through ICLEO program

Applications are available for the Indiana Conference for Legal Education Opportunity program. The ICLEO program is designed to assist traditionally underrepresented groups in pursuing a legal career. The Indiana Supreme Court established ICLEO in 1997 to help bring diversity to the legal profession. Since then more than 600 have graduated as ICLEO fellows.

Applications are available online at www.courts.in.gov/ cleo and are due by March 6, 2020

ICLEO offers students a preparatory institute the summer before law school. This year, the institute is being hosted at the Indiana University McKinney School of Law in Indianapolis. The Summer Institute curriculum places a strong emphasis on academic rigor and provides professional development programming, field visits, and social events. Students who successfully complete the Summer Institute may be eligible for a fellowship award for up to six semesters. The award is currently \$4,800 per semester.

To be eligible, applicants must be college graduates and must be accepted to an ABA-accredited law school in Indiana by the time the six-week ICLEO Summer Institute begins in June 2020. All applicants go through a rigorous application process that is separate from the Indiana law school application process.

This day in history

February 14, 1929

In Chicago, gunmen in the suspected employment of Al Capone murdered seven members of the George "Bugs" Moran North Siders gang in a garage on North Clark Street. The so-called St. Valentine's Day Massacre stirred a media storm centered on Capone and his illegal Prohibition-era activities and motivated federal authorities to redouble their efforts to place him behind bars.

At the age of 18, Capone was employed at a Conev Island club owned by gangster Frankie Yale. While working there, his face was slashed in a brawl, earning him the nickname "Scarface".

In 1925, Capone's boss, Johnny Torrio, was shot four times by Bugs Moran and Hymie Weiss, who were associates of a gangster slain by Torrio's men. Torrio lived, but called Capone to tell him that he was retiring and handing the business over to him.

Capone was in Florida when he gave the go-ahead for the assassination of Moran. A bootlegger called Moran and offered to sell him a truckload of high-quality whiskey at a low price. Wearing stolen police uniforms and heavily armed, Capone's henchmen surprised the rival gang, who agreed to line up against the wall, thinking they had fallen prey to a routine police raid. A moment later, seven men were gunned down in a hail of shotgun and submachine-gun fire.

Environmental education workshops available online contest kicks off with digital format for teachers, youth group leaders, and home schoolers

Indiana teachers, youth group leaders, home school parents, and others who want to educate children about the environment can now take a Project Learning Tree workshop, online, at their convenience.

PLT, for which the Indiana DNR Division of Forestry is the state's sponsor, is an international, award-winning environmental education program for children in grades Pre-K through 12. PLT's activities have been developed by teachers, for teachers. Through PLT, students gain knowledge and develop critical thinking skills while participating in hands-on, multidisciplinary activities. PLT's well-organized activities teach to Reading, Writing, Social Studies, Math, as well as STEM, and are correlated to both state and national academic standards.

Participants in a PLT workshop will learn how to use the activities and receive a digital copy of the PLT K-8 curriculum guide. Other materials and opportunities will become available upon completion of the course. Cost is \$40 per person. Four professional growth points will be awarded upon successful completion of the course. An outline of the course is included within the introductory pages.

To enroll in the course, teachers/youth leaders simply log in to www.shop.plt. org. Once the course has been purchased, prospec-

tive participants go to "my account>my content" and click on K-8 course "online training" where they will be directed to the actual course.

Indiana Conservation Officers urge Hoosiers to practice ice safety; 'No ice is safe ice'

Indiana Conservation Offi- how to safely have fun on ice. cers advise being mindful of the potential hazards of frozen lakes, ponds, rivers and

It's also important to keep a watchful eye on neighborhood retention ponds, lakes and other waterways for others who may venture out and find themselves in trouble.

Every winter, thousands of Hoosiers safely enjoy fishing, skating, hiking, or just sliding around on frozen ponds and lakes. And every year, people drown after falling through ice.

Just like driving differently on snow versus clear roads, some may need to re-learn

Put safety first. The best rule of thumb is, when thinking about getting on the ice, believe it is thin ice unless proven otherwise.

Here are a few tips to remember when considering standing on or walking on a frozen lake or pond:

- No ice is safe ice.
- Test the thickness of the ice with an ice auger. At least 4 inches of ice is recommended for ice fishing; 5 inches is recommended for snowmobiling.
- If you don't know the thickness of the ice, don't
- Wear life jackets or flota-

- Carry ice hooks and rope
- Before going on the ice, leave a note of your whereabouts with a friend or family member.
- Don't test the thickness of the ice while alone.

Wearing a life jacket is especially important when on the ice. If you fall through, a life jacket will keep your head above the water until help arrives.

Snow can insulate ice, causing it to freeze at a slower rate. When snow and rain freeze into ice, it is never as strong as solid, clear ice.

If you see a pet or other an-

imal in distress on the ice, do not go after it. Doing so can often end in tragedy. Instead, contact your local emergency response personnel, who are equipped to make a rescue.

Some bodies of water will appear to be frozen solid but actually can have thin ice in several potentially unexpected areas. Flowing water, such as rivers and streams, should be avoided when covered by a layer of ice. Water that is surrounded by sand may freeze with inconsistencies in the thickness of the ice.

Underground wind, waterfowl and other animals can also keep areas of ice thin.




