The Blessing of Animals

will take place at St. Mary Catholic Church on Sunday, October 3, at 2 p.m.

Those who bring their cats, dogs, birds, snakes, hamsters, and other pets will gather in the grass on the west side of St. Mary Catholic Community School, near the playground. During the ritual, Father Kevin Huber will proclaim a scripture reading, offer petitions, impart the prayer of blessing,

and sprinkle the animals with holy water. Everyone is invited to participate, Catholic and non-Catholic and all animals are welcome. The pastor simply asks that pets are on leashes or are appropriately contained.

St. Mary Parish is a Catholic community built on the foundations of worship, hospitality, service, and education. Located in the historic district of Crown

Point, this community has provided Christian witness to South Lake County since 1865. Masses are celebrated every weekday at 7:45 a.m., Saturdays at 4:30 p.m. and Sundays at 7:30 a.m., 9 a.m., 10:30 a.m., and 12 p.m. Everyone is welcome and no reservations are necessary.

The most common contaminants our pets are exposed to and how to avoid them

This issue grabbed headlines when it was revealed that domestic dogs and horses were suffering from health issues and premature death from exposure through drinking water to chemicals emitted by a chemical plant in Bladen County, North Carolina.

The offending chemicals—perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) that are added to everyday products to make them water, grease, and stain-resistant—fall to the ground with rain.

They then permeate soils and the water table for some 18 miles in every direction.

Most residents of this rural area get their drinking water from private wells that do not benefit from community clean water filtration systems or standards.

A court challenge by local clean water advocates prompted a local judge to order Chemours Fayetteville Works to provide local residents with water filtration systems to filter out offending chemicals. But many locals say they can't rest easy until the factory closes altogether.

If you do live within the pollution radius of a factory, you'll want to get your drinking water (and air quality) tested for contaminants on a regular basis to make sure you, your family members and pets aren't getting poi-

soned. If the results aren't good, it may be time to see if any neighbors are experiencing issues and start asking some questions to get to the bottom of where the pollution might be coming from.

There are of course many other threats to pets even if you don't live near a pollution 'point source'. In one study, researchers found that the brains of dogs exposed to the heavy and constant air pollution of Mexico City had significantly elevated inflammation and pathology profiles (including neurofibrillary tangles that cause Alzheimer's in humans) compared to dogs from more rural, less polluted regions.

Since our pets spend lots of time walking and running

through-not to mention rolling around in and even nibbling on—the grass, it's not surprising that they are much more likely to pick up and ingest contaminants than their owners. If your dog or cat develops a skin rash, vomiting, diarrhea, excessive salivation, dilated pupils, lack of coordination, or respiratory difficulties, it may be related to chemical exposure. Regarding longerterm effects, one study in Massachusetts showed that dogs whose owners used pesticides in their own yards had a 70 percent higher chance of developing malignant lymphoma. Indeed, one-third of the 700 dogs in the study were diagnosed with this typically terminal canine cancer.



If your dog or cat wants to run free in a neighbor's yard or at the park, wait 24-72 hours after the lawn in question has been treated with chemicals of any kind (fertilizers, herbicides, pesticides) to minimize exposure to and ingestion of potentially hazardous substances. You can also lobby your neighbors and local officials to give up the harsh synthetic chemicals; some will be more open to the idea than others, so make sure you have a good way to protect your pets even if your requests aren't complied with.



Get vaccinated to prevent Covid, flu 'double-whammy', say emergency physicians

There are early signs that the coming flu season could be severe, and the American College of Emergency Physicians (ACEP) joins other health experts in recommending that everyone eligible get vaccinated against Covid-19 and the influenza (flu) to help prevent the spread of either virus.

"Last year, more people staying home and covering their faces when they did go out kept flu numbers historically low, but this year the situation could be dangerously different," said Mark Rosenberg, DO, MBA, FACEP, president of ACEP. "Unfortunately, misinformation is rampant, and the risk of getting or spreading either virus increases as more people dismiss proven public

health protocols.

The flu and Covid-19 are different respiratory viruses with similar symptoms. Based on all of the available information, health experts agree that the COVID vaccine is safe and effective, and the flu vaccine is recommended for everyone six months of age and older. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recently updated its guidance to clarify that it is safe to get the flu shot at the same time as the Covid-19 vaccine—if you're eligible for a first, second or third shot.

Those with chronic health conditions, elderly individuals, racial or ethnic minorities, and healthcare and other essential workers are particularly vulnerable to these viruses. Flu season starts in the fall and can last until spring so emergency physicians suggest getting a flu shot by the end of October, in time for colder weather and before holiday travel.

"We should be taking every precaution to protect ourselves and our loved ones from either virus. Getting vaccinated is one of the best ways to avoid the double whammy of flu and Covid," said Dr. Rosenberg.

Residents of Lake, Porter counties can resume feeding birds, DNR announces

The Indiana DNR had recommended a statewide moratorium on bird feeding earlier this summer to slow the spread of a still-undetermined illness that is killing birds across the state. Biologists identified more than 750 possible cases in 76 counties that involved a specific set of clinical signs, including crusty eyes, eye discharge, and neurological issues.

The actions of many Hoosiers significantly helped the DNR's work related to the disease outbreak. By tak-

ing down their feeders and submitting more than 4,300 reports, residents enabled DNR staff track the disease, detect regional differences, and provide updated recommendations for feeding birds.

Residents throughout Indiana may again put out their feeders if they are comfortable doing so and are not observing sick or dead birds in their yards. DNR strongly encourages residents who do so to clean seed and suet feeders at least once every two weeks by scrub-

bing feeders with soap and water, followed by a short soak in a 10% bleach solution. Hummingbird feeders should be cleaned at least once a week with a 10% bleach solution and rinsed thoroughly.

DNR biologists also encourage Hoosiers to continue reporting any sick or dead birds they find to www. on.IN.gov/sickwildlife.

Harvest season is here; motorists urged to remain alert to slow moving equipment

Harvest season is here and for some that means visiting pumpkin patches and apple orchards, but the Indiana State Department of Agriculture wants to remind motorists that harvest season also means farmers will begin harvesting this year's corn and soybean crops.

That means more slowmoving agricultural equipment will be traveling on Indiana's rural roads and highways. We want to remind everyone to stay alert and be courteous to ensure we all get home safely.

In 2019 in Indiana, farm equipment vehicles (other than trucks) were involved in three accidents, with one fatality, according to the National Highway Traffic Administration.

"Harvest season is a busy time for both farmers and motorists, I want to remind everyone to slow down and be courteous on our rural roads and highways," said Bruce Kettler, director of the Indiana State Department of Agriculture. "Slow moving farm equipment typically travels at 25 miles per hour or less, so be sure to exercise caution when approaching."

Farm equipment during harvest season could include tractors, combines, grain carts, grain wagons and large trucks hauling agricultural products. These vehicles are wide, sometimes taking up

most of the road, and often travel at speeds no greater than 25 mph.

The following list includes several safety tips for motorists approaching large farm equipment:

- Farmers will pull over when they are able to let motorists pass, but it may take time for them to get to a safe place to do so.
- Be patient. Farm equipment is wide, sometimes

taking up most of the road. • Be careful when passing. Do not pass in a designated "No Passing Zone" or within 100 feet of any intersection, railroad grade crossing, bridge, elevation structure or

tunnel. • Do not try to pass a slowmoving vehicle on the left without ensuring that the vehicle is not planning a left turn. It may appear that the driver is pulling over for

you to pass when it is actually preparing to turn. You will drive right into its path, endangering yourself and the

- Avoid tailgating, as some farm equipment might have to make sudden stops along the road.
- Allow plenty of time to get to a destination, be aware of alternate routes and avoid distractions.

This week in history

September 25, 1978

A Pacific Southwest Airlines jet collided in midair with a small Cessna over San Diego, killing 153 people. The wreckage of the planes fell into a populous neighborhood and did extensive damage on the ground.

David Lee Boswell and his instructor, Martin Kazy, were in the process of a flying lesson in a singleengine Cessna, practicing approaches at San Diego's Lindbergh Field airport. After two successful passes, Boswell aimed the Cessna toward the Montgomery Field northeast of San Diego.

At the same time, Pacific Southwest Flight 182 was approaching San Diego. The Boeing 727 was carrying 144 passengers and crew members from Sacramento. Though air-traffic controllers at Lindbergh had told Boswell to keep the Cessna below 3,500 feet altitude as it flew northeast, the Cessna did not comply.

The pilots of Flight 182 could see the Cessna clearly at but soon lost sight of it and failed to inform the controllers. Meanwhile, the conflict-alert warning system began to flash at the air-traffic control center. However, because the alert system went off so frequently with false alarms, it was ignored. Within a minute, the planes collided.

The fuel in the 727 burst into a massive fireball upon impact. The planes nose-dived straight into San Diego's North Park neighborhood, destroying 22 homes and killing seven people on the ground.



10-digit dialing for telephone customers in area code 219 mandatory by October 24

All telephone users in the 219 and 574 area codes of northern Indiana are encouraged to start using 10-digit dialing instead of seven digit to make local phone calls this month. Time is getting short as the mandatory deadline date nears when you must dial 10 digits to make a call.

The full transition will be mandatory by October 24 of this year.

The Federal Communications Commission is requiring this change to accommodate the implementing of the national "988" National

Suicide Prevention Lifeline, which will be fully applied by July 16, 2022.

Residential and Business customers in the 219 and 574 area codes should be aware of the following:

- Your telephone number and area code will not change.
- In these area codes, you will need to dial the area code + telephone number (a total of 10 digits).
- All long-distance calls will still require dialing 1 + area code + telephone number (a total of 11 digits).
- Calls that are currently lo-

cal will remain local.

- 10-digit dialing will not change the price of a local call, coverage area, or other rates and services.
- You can still dial three digits to reach 911 (emergency services), 211 (social services), 411 (directory assistance), 711 (telecommunications relay service), or 811 (call to request utility locate before you dig)
- Start including your area code when giving out your

phone number

- · Make sure all preprogrammed numbers for local calls are set to include the area code (like fax machines, life safety systems, etc.)
- Make sure your website, stationery, checks, pet tags, etc. include your area code
- · Any safety and security equipment must be programmed to include 10-digit local dialing unless they're already directed to longdistance or toll-free.

• Contact your medical alert of security provider if you are unsure if your equipment needs to be reprogrammed.

• All reprogramming must be completed by October 24. Residents are encouraged to begin this process now.
