American Association in Northwest Indiana is kicking off the third year of the Little Hats, Big Hearts campaign by collecting knitted or crocheted red baby hats. The campaign is being sponsored locally in Northwest Indiana by Bosak Auto Group.

Avoid use of alternative heating; exercise caution when necessary

Cold weather is upon United States." Northwest Indiana after a mild start to the season, and Hoosiers to take precautions Hoosiers trying to avoid turning on the heat should exercise caution when using alternative methods to heat their homes.

"Alternative heating sources are one of the leading causes of home fires and fire-related deaths each year," said State Fire Marshal Jim Greeson. "Fires caused by alternative heating equipment account for 19 percent of home fire deaths in the and furniture.

Marshal Greeson advises if alternative sources are in use. Here are a few tips to safely stay warm this season:

- Avoid using space heaters and other alternative heating if possible.
- Keep at least a three-foot perimeter around space heaters at all times.
- Space heaters should be kept away from loose or flammable objects such as clothing, curtains, bedding
- Only one space heater should be plugged into each electrical outlet. Never overload electrical outlets.
- Do not leave space heaters on in unoccupied rooms.
- If it is necessary to purchase a space heater, consider purchasing one with a built-in tilt sensor that automatically shuts off if tipped over.
- Refuel kerosene space heaters outside the home in a well-ventilated area. Be sure to let them cool down first if they were recently used.
- Appliances such as ovens should never be used for heating. Doing so can lead to carbon monoxide poisoning.
- Fireplaces should be regularly cleaned and inspected by a certified professional. Gas fireplaces should have proper ventilation, with a working carbon monoxide detector nearby.
- Use only dry, seasoned firewood to prevent build-up of creosote, which can prevent the chimney from venting properly.
- Make sure not to close the

damper too early when hot ashes are still in the fireplace. Doing so can force dangerous levels of carbon monoxide into the home.

- Avoid using flammable liquid to start fires in fireplaces or wood stoves. Always have a fire extinguisher on hand in case the fire gets out of control.
- Remember, fires should always be extinguished and any alternative heating sources turned off before going to bed or leaving the home.

Marshal Greeson strongly advises Hoosiers to consider other options before using alternative heating.

- Wear long underwear. It might sound old fashioned, but this will reduce bodily heat loss and enhance warmth and comfort. One layer of thermal long underwear can allow for a savings on heating costs. After all, each person's body is a human furnace that generates







This day in history

December 15, 1890

After many years of successfully resisting white efforts to destroy him and the Sioux people, the great Sioux chief and holy man Sitting Bull was killed by Indian police at the Standing Rock reservation in South Dakota. One of the most famous Native Americans of the 19th century, Sitting Bull was a fierce enemy of Anglo-Americans from a young age.

The Native American chief was devoted to the traditional ways. He believed that contact with non-Native Americans undermined the strength and identity of his Sioux tribe and would ultimately lead to their decline.

His refusal to bring his people onto a reservation led to the Battle of Little Bighorn, which the Sioux and Chevenne won by defeating the troops of General George Armstrong Custer's 7th Cavalry.

Sitting Bull and his followers fled, but faced with mass starvation, they returned and surrendered. With the revival of the spiritual Native American Ghost Dance on the reservation, U.S. agents feared it might lead to an uprising and police were sent to arrest the chief.

He refused to go quietly and a crowd gathered. A shot was fired that hit an officer; the police retaliated by shooting Sitting Bull and killing him on December 15, 1890.

Two weeks later, the United State Army suppressed the Ghost Dance movement with the massacre of the Sioux at Wounded Knee, South Dakota, which was the last battle of the American-Indian War.

"You want to have the right fuel on hand and review your owner's manual now so you can use your equipment safe-

Kiser says preparation is key and that home and business owners should consider the following tips:

Review your owner's manual. Check your owner's manual for safe handling procedures. If you lost your manual, you can look it up online (and store a copy on your computer so you have the manual available to reference in the future). Review how to operate the controls. You should be able to shut off your equipment quickly.

Check your equipment. The snow thrower should be completely powered off when you are checking it over. If you forgot to drain the fuel last winter before storing your snow thrower, drain the gas tank now. Adjust any cables. Check the auger.

Put your equipment where you can get to it easily. Move your equipment to a convenient and accessible location, so you can get to it easily when you need it.

Purchase your fuel. Often gas stations are closed after a storm. Be sure to use the correct fuel, as recommended by your equipment's manufacturer; for more information on fueling properly see www. LookBeforeYouPump.com. Fill up the fuel tank outside before you start the engine and while the engine is cold. Never add fuel to a running or hot engine.

Store your fuel properly. Place fuel in a fuel container and label it with the date purchased and the ethanol content of the fuel. Fuel that is more than 30 days old can phase separate and cause operating problems. It's important to use fresh fuel in your snow thrower. Make sure fuel is stored safely and out of the reach of children.

Tidy the area you intend to clear with your equipment. Snow can sometimes hide objects. Doormats, hoses, balls, toys, boards, wires, and

other debris should be removed from the areas you intend to clear. When run over by a snow thrower, these objects may harm the machine or people.

Plan to dress for winter weather. Locate your safety gear now, and place it in an accessible closet or location in your home. Plan to wear safety glasses, gloves and footwear that can handle cold and slippery surfaces.

Never put your hands inside the auger or chute. Use a clean out tool or stick to unclog snow or debris from your snow thrower. Your hands should never go inside the auger or chute.

Turn OFF your snow thrower if you need to clear a clog. If you need to remove debris or unclog snow, always turn off your snow thrower. Wait for all moving parts to come to a complete

stop before clearing any clogs or debris.

Only use your snow thrower in visible conditions. Never operate the snow thrower without good visibility or light.

Aim your snow thrower with care. Never throw snow toward people or cars. Do not allow anyone to stand in front of your snow thrower. Keep children or pets away from your snow thrower when it is operating.

Use extreme caution on slopes and hills. Use caution when changing directions on slopes. Do not attempt to clear steep slopes.

Know where your cord is. If you have an electric powered snow thrower, be aware of where the power cord is at all times. Avoid tripping. Do not run over the power cord.

Keep pets and children inside. Kids and pets may love to play in the white stuff, but it's best to keep them inside your home and under supervision while you are using your snow thrower to clear a path or drive. Do not allow them to play in the snow as it is tossed out of the snow thrower's chute.

The gift pack includes a 2018 resident Annual Entrance Permit, a one-year subscription to Outdoor Indiana magazine, and one of two \$65 gift card options. Choose between a \$65 State Park Camp gift card or a \$65 Inns gift card. In past years, the gift pack gift card applied only to Inns.

The buyer saves \$31 over the regular price of the items purchased separately. Orders ship within three to five business days. The offer is available through December 31. Indiana has 32 state parks and reservoirs throughout the state. The entrance permit grants gate entrance for all of 2018 for all state parks and reservoirs beginning January

The Inns gift card can be used at any of seven state park lodging facilities, as well as at the award-winning Pete Dye-designed golf course at Fort Harrison State Park in Indianapolis. The inns gift card can be used for lodging, meals in the dining rooms or gift card purchases.

The camping gift card can be used at any state park or reservoir campground, as well as at the following DNR Division of Forestry properties: Greene-Sullivan State Forest, Covered Bridge Retreat, and Deam Lake and Starve Hollow state recre-

ation areas. The gift card can be used toward cabins (excluding inns-operated cabins), campsites, cottages, group camps, recreation buildings, rent-a-camp cabins, shelters, and youth & rally camps.

In addition to camping, the camp gift card also may be used to pay for daily or annual entrance fees, lake permits, horse tags, and many other items sold by a state park property, except for those operations run by private concessionaires.


