## Nipsco accepting applications for environmental action grants

Nipsco is accepting applications for its Environmental Action Grant to support local nonprofit organizations with environmental initiatives. For the eighth consecutive year, Nipsco will provide support for environmental restoration and education projects throughout northern Indiana.

"Our employees are passionate about investing in the communities where they live and work, and we have a lot of energy to give to the communities we serve," said Rick Calinski, Nipsco Director of Public Affairs and Economic Development. "We are proud to provide help to local organizations dedicated to benefiting and revitalizing our environment."

In 2022, winning organizations used the grants to fund education and restoration projects such as:

- The Nature Conservancy in Indiana: The organization used their Environmental Action Grant to support East Chicago's Festival de la Monarca, educating the public about endangered Monarch butterflies and their migration patterns while celebrating the culture of their annual migration to Michoacan, Mexico.
- The Watershed Foundation: Environmental Action Grant was used to remove an aging dam from Deeds Creek in Warsaw, Ind. The dam removal is expected to improve water quality, reconnect aquatic organism passage and increase habitat in Deeds Creek.
- Girl Scouts of Northern Indiana-Michiana: **Environmental Action Grant**

allowed Girl Scouts throughout the region to participate in the "It's Your Planet, Love It!" leadership journey, teaching environmental top-

ics such as clean water and air, noise pollution, global warming, soil contamination, and agricultural processes. Humane Indiana's

Environmental and Wildlife Education Center: Humane Indiana used the grant it received to provide care to injured or orphaned wild animals native to Indiana at their Wildlife Rehabilitation Center. The Center receives wildlife as small as hummingbirds and chipmunks to animals as large as coyote, fox, opossums, eagles and other species in need of various levels of rehab assistance.

### Lakeshore PBS launched new season of local series 'Eye on the Arts' this week

Lakeshore PBS is back with its Emmy-winning local series 'Eye on the Arts' that premiered its eighth season on Wednesday.

'Eye on the Arts' is a halfhour program that showcases a diverse range of local artists, artistic organizations, events and stories, demonstrating the power of arts in people's lives, and how art and culture improve the quality of life for residents throughout Northwest Indiana and Chicagoland.

Indiana Donor Network, Donor Network," said Indiana the federally designated organ recovery organization that coordinates organ, tissue and cornea donation in Indiana and transplantation throughout the U.S., hit new heights in 2022, transplanting an all-time high of 1,116 lifesaving organs.

The milestone is an 18% increase in annual transplants compared to 2021, when 949 organs were transplanted.

"I'm proud to say we're on the right trajectory and the future is bright for Indiana

Donor Network President and CEO Kellie Tremain. "We are dedicated to investing in cutting-edge technology, new and innovative processes and highly skilled professionals across all disciplines for those in need of lifesaving transplants."

Also, the selfless gifts of 1,267 tissue and cornea donor heroes resulted in 14,392 tissues recovered in 2022, including 141 hearts for valve transplant, 3,701 skin grafts and 382 corneas.

New liver perfusion technology deployed: Indiana Donor Network took an industry leading step in 2022 by training in advanced perfusion technology that has the potential to keep donated livers functioning outside the human body for up to 24 hours with the use of a liver transporter.

Last year, Indiana Donor Network participated in a trial study in partnership with four Midwest transplant centers, including University of Cincinnati Medical Center, Chicago, University of


University Northwestern and Rutgers' University Hospital. Once approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, Indiana Donor Network intends to deploy the device for use in liver transplants at all transplant centers the organization

When packed in a traditional cold storage device, donated livers can remain outside the body for only 12 hours. Keeping a donated liver functioning longer after recovery with a liver transporter will create more time for medical teams to assess a liver's viability for transplant, improve a liver's function, and ultimately make more livers available for transplantation.

Kidney perfusion technology saving more lives: Indiana Donor Network's team of surgical recovery specialists is also specially trained in the use of kidney perfusion pumps, which are utilized in operating rooms during organ recovery and for transport to a transplant center.

Pumps keep donated kidneys functioning outside the body, allowing the organ's temperature and vascular performance to be constantly monitored and increasing its viability for successful transplant. Donated kidneys on perfusion pumps can be transported up to 250 nautical miles from Indiana Donor Network's Organ and Tissue Recover Center, reaching patients at 40 transplant centers throughout the Midwest.

Network utilized 10 kidney perfusion pumps for 622 successful transplant surgeries. Other major milestones achieved by Indiana Donor Network in 2022:

- Provided programs, grief and counseling services and support to 2,253 donor family members.
- Registered 960,000 Indiana residents to become organ and tissue donors, an all-time high number of new registrants in a single year; today, more than 4.3 mil-

lion Hoosiers are registered donors.

- Relied on passionate donation advocates who volunteered nearly 14,000 hours, equivalent to more than six full-time employees.
- Led nearly 950 school and community presentations and activations, reaching more than 200,000 Hoosiers.
- Generated nearly \$180,000 in net proceeds for Indiana Donor Network Foundation and its mission to provide financial assistance and support for organ transplant re-

cipients and donor families.

• Hired 45 new team members for a total of 284, creating its largest staff since the organization was founded in

Nationally, in 2022 the U.S. surpassed 1 million lifesaving organ transplants since the first was performed in 1954, according to United Network for Organ Sharing. A new annual high of 42,887 organs were successfully transplanted in 2022.

More than 105,000 Americans are currently awaiting a lifesaving organ transplant, including 1,200 Hoosiers.

"The need for more people to make the selfless decision to one day become a donor hero remains incredibly important," Tremain said. "Working with our hospital and transplant center partners throughout Indiana and beyond, we remain laser focused on saving more lives each year through donation and transplantation, educating more Hoosiers about how important donation is, and encouraging Indiana

residents to say 'yes' to donation."

Indiana Donor Network's mission is to save and enhance the quality of life through organ, tissue and eye donation and transplantation. Its vision is to be a leader in organ and tissue recovery.

Founded in 1987, the organization coordinates donation in 85 of the state's 92 counties and serves transplant hospitals throughout the U.S.

## Th<u>i</u>s week in history

March 18, 1852

Henry Wells and William G. Fargo joined with several other investors to launch their namesake business.

The discovery of gold in California in 1849 prompted a huge spike in the demand for cross-country shipping. Wells and Fargo decided to take advantage and in July 1852, their company shipped its first loads of freight from the East Coast to mining camps scattered around northern California.


The company contracted with independent stagecoach companies to provide the fastest possible transportation and delivery of gold dust, important documents, and other valuable freight. It also served as a bank-buying gold dust, selling paper bank drafts, and providing loans to help fuel California's growing economy.

Wells, Fargo became the leader in transportation in the West. When the transcontinental railroad was completed three years later, the company began using railroad to transport its freight. By 1910, its shipping network connected 6,000 locations.

After splitting from the freight business in 1905, the banking branch of the company merged with the Nevada National Bank and established new headquarters in San Francisco.

The following April, the banking headquarters was destroyed in a major earthquake, but the vaults remained intact and the bank's business continued to grow. After two later mergers, Wells Fargo Bank became, and has remained, one of the biggest banking institutions in the United States.

## Franciscan Health helping AFib patients live more active lifestyles

A procedure offered at Franciscan Health Crown Point is allowing cardiac patients with atrial fibrillation (AFib) to eliminate the use of blood thinners and live more active lifestyles.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), AFib is the most common type of irregular heartbeat. The CDC estimates 6 million Americans have Afib, which significantly increases the risk of stroke.

One of the primary treatments for AFib is blood thinners, which are used to prevent blood clots that travel to the brain and cause strokes. While blood thinners are effective, they come with bleeding risks.

"When you have Afib, you're stuck on blood thinners, sometimes forever," said Franciscan Physician Network Cardiologist Mark A Mitchell, DO, FHRS, FACC. "If you're a young hands at the steel mill all day, your choice then becomes do you want to have a stroke or potentially have a lift-threatening bleeding event if you have an accident on the job? If the answer is neither, then that's where the WATCHMAN can come in."

Franciscan Health Crown Point offers the WATCHMAN procedure, which was first introduced in the fall of 2020. During







ly invasive procedure, a Franciscan Health clinical cardiac electrophysiologist and interventional cardiologist use a catheter to guide the WATCHMAN implant to the patient's left atrial appendage (LAA) in the heart through a small incision in the inner thigh. By permanently closing the LAA, the WATCHMAN device prevents clots from forming in the prime location that can lead to stroke.

Patients can expect to return home the next day and will continue taking blood thinners until the LAA is permanently closed, typically for about 45 days.

James Hoover, 76, is a retired business owner from Michigan City who knows firsthand the benefits of the WATCHMAN procedure. Hoover had a heart ablation in 2009, but was still required to take strong blood thinners to lower his risk of stroke.

Hoover enjoys skiing in the mountains out West and was concerned he would have to stop. He received a flyer in the mail from Franciscan Health about the WATCHMAN procedure and called Eunjin Choi, a cardiac nurse practitioner at Franciscan Physician Network Cardiology Dyer, to set up a consultation.

Hoover met with Choi, who with the interventional cardiac electrophysiology and cardiology team determined he was a good candidate for the WATCHMAN procedure with Dr. Mitchell.

"I can't say enough good things about Eunjin Choi and Dr. Mitchell," Hoover said. "I was an engineer by trade and I like having my questions answered quickly, not two weeks, three weeks down the road. They were great."

Hoover said the WATCHMAN procedure has allowed him to return to his active lifestyle.

"I've been off blood thinners for several months and I'm feeling like I never have before," Hoover said. "I have not had any return of AFib. I'm 76 and I feel like I'm in my 50s. I told them I'm not going to change my lifestyle and now I don't have to."

Gerald Lipski, 74, of Schererville, was in good health, but two years ago had a slipped disk in his back that required surgery. His presurgical testing revealed he had AFib.

He was referred to Dr. Mitchell and after two cardiac procedures, was placed on blood thinners.

Lipski is retired and spends his weekends photographing horse events, often for 10 or 12 hours a day while carrying heavy equipment. He didn't want to have to stop doing what he loves because of the risks involved with taking blood thinners for life.

"I saw a poster on the wall for the WATCHMAN and finally asked about it," Lipski said. "Eunjin explained it really well and I said, 'Well, let's get it done."

Choi said Hoover and Lipski were both excellent candidates for the WATCHMAN procedure because they already had excellent qualities of life, were very active and took good care of themselves.

"Compliance is very important," Choi said. "I tell patients that for six months after the procedure, you're

going to be my very good friend," due to the need for follow-up appointments.

Lipski said he would recommend the WATCHMAN procedure to anyone with
